3. All questions in section $A$ are to be answered in one word, one sentence or as per the exact requirement of the question.
4. There is no overall choice. However, internal choice has been provided in 4 questions of four marks each and 2 questions of six marks each. You have to attempt only one of the alternatives in all such questions.
5. Use of calculators is not permitted. You may ask for logarithmic tables, if required.

## SECTION - A

1. Evaluate: $\int \frac{\log x}{x} d x$
2. If $A=\left[\begin{array}{cc}\cos \alpha & -\sin \alpha \\ \sin \alpha & \cos \alpha\end{array}\right]$, then for what value of $\alpha$ is $A$ an identity matrix?
3. What is the principal value of $\cos ^{-1}\left(-\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right)$ ?
4. What is the cosine of the angle which the vector $\sqrt{2} \hat{i}+\hat{j}+k$ makes with $y$-axis?
5. Write a vector of magnitude 15 units in the direction of vector $\hat{\mathrm{i}}-2 \hat{\mathrm{j}}+2 \mathrm{k}$
6. What is the range of the function $f(x)=\frac{|x-1|}{(x-1)}$ ?
7. Find the minor of the element of second row and third column ( $\mathrm{a}_{23}$ ) in the following determinant:
$\left|\begin{array}{ccc}2 & -3 & 5 \\ 6 & 0 & 4 \\ 1 & 5 & -7\end{array}\right|$

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8. Write the vector equation of the following line:

$$
\frac{x-5}{3}=\frac{y+4}{7}=\frac{6-z}{2}
$$

9. What is the degree of the following differential equation?

$$
5 x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-6 y=\log x
$$

10.If $\left[\begin{array}{ll}1 & 2 \\ 3 & 4\end{array}\right]\left[\begin{array}{ll}3 & 1 \\ 2 & 5\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{ll}7 & 11 \\ k & 23\end{array}\right]$, then write the value of $k$.
SECTION - B
11. Find all points of discontinuity of $f$, where $f$ is defined as following:
$f(x)= \begin{cases}|x|+3 & , x \leq-3 \\ -2 x & ,-3<x<3 \\ 6 x+2 & , x \geq 3\end{cases}$

## OR

Find $\frac{d y}{d x}$, if $y=(\cos x)^{x}+(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}$
12.Prove the following:
$\tan ^{-1} \sqrt{\mathrm{x}}=\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{1-\mathrm{x}}{1+\mathrm{x}}\right), \mathrm{x} \in(0,1)$

## OR

Prove the following:
$\cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)+\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)=\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{65}\right)$
13.On a multiple choice examination with three possible answers (out of which only one is correct) for each of the five questions, what is the probability that a candidate would get four or more correct answers just by guessing?
14.Let * be a binary operation on $Q$ defined by $a * b=\frac{3 a b}{5}$

Show that $*$ is commutative as well as associative. Also find its identity element, if it exists.
15. Using elementary row operations, find the inverse of the following matrix:

$$
\left[\begin{array}{ll}
2 & 5 \\
1 & 3
\end{array}\right]
$$

16. Find the Cartesian equation of the plane passing through the points $A(0,0,0)$ and $B(3,-1,2)$ and parallel to the line $\frac{x-4}{1}=\frac{y+3}{-4}=\frac{z+1}{7}$
17.Find the position vector of a point $R$ which divides the line joining two points $P$ and $Q$ whose position vectors are $(2 \vec{a}+\vec{b})$ and $(\vec{a}-3 \vec{b})$ respectively, externally in the ratio 1:2. Also, show that $P$ is the midpoint of the line segment $R$.
17. Evaluate: $\int_{0}^{\pi} \frac{x}{1+\sin x} d x$
18. Evaluate: $\int e^{x}\left(\frac{\sin 4 x-4}{1-\cos 4 x}\right) d x$

## OR

Evaluate: $\int \frac{1-x^{2}}{x(1-2 x)} d x$
20. Find the equations of the normals to the curve $y=x^{3}+2 x+6$ which are parallel to the line $x+14 y+4=0$.
21. Find the particular solution of the differential equation satisfying the given conditions: $x^{2} d y+\left(x y+y^{2}\right) d x=0 ; y=1$ when $x=1$.
22. Find the general solution of the differential equation, $x \log x \frac{d y}{d x}+y=\frac{2}{x} \log x$

## OR

Find the particular solution of the differential equation satisfying the given conditions: $\frac{d y}{d x}=y \tan x$, given that $y=1$ when $x=0$.

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## SECTION - C

23. Evaluate $\int_{1}^{3}\left(3 x^{2}+2 x\right) d x$ as limit of sums.

## OR

Using integration, find the area of the following region:

$$
\left\{(x, y): \frac{x^{2}}{9}+\frac{y^{2}}{4} \leq 1 \leq \frac{x}{3}+\frac{y}{2}\right\}
$$

24. A small firm manufactures gold rings and chains. The total number of rings and chains manufactured per day is at most 24. It takes 1 hour to make a ring and 30 minutes to make a chain. The maximum number of hours available per day is 16 . If the profit on a ring is Rs. 300 and that on a chain is Rs. 190, find the number of rings and chains that should be manufactured per day, so as to earn the maximum profit. Make it as an L.P.P. and solve it graphically.
25. A card form a pack of 52 cards is lost. From the remaining cards of the pack, two cards are drawn at random and are found to be both clubs. Find the probability of the lost card being of clubs.

## OR

From a lot of 10 bulbs, which includes 3 defectives, a sample of 2 bulbs is drawn at random. Find the probability distribution of the number of defective bulbs.
26. Using properties of determinants show the following:

$$
\left|\begin{array}{ccc}
(b+c)^{2} & a b & c a \\
a b & (a+c)^{2} & b c \\
a c & b c & (a+b)^{2}
\end{array}\right|=2 a b c(a+b+c)^{3}
$$

27. Find the values of $x$ for which $f(x)=[x(x-2)]^{2}$ is an increasing function. Also, find the points on the curve where the tangent is parallel to x -axis.
28. Show that the right circular cylinder, open at the top, and of given surface area and maximum volume is such that its height is equal to the radius of the base.
29. Write the vector equations of the following lines and hence determine the distance between them:

$$
\frac{x-1}{2}=\frac{y-2}{3}=\frac{z+4}{6} ; \frac{x-3}{4}=\frac{y-3}{6}=\frac{z+5}{12}
$$

## SECTION - A

1. $I=\int \frac{\log x}{x} d x$

Substitute $\log \mathrm{x}=\mathrm{t}$
Differentiating w.r.t. $x$, we get
$\frac{1}{\mathrm{x}} \mathrm{dx}=\mathrm{dt}$
Onsubstitution, weget

$$
I=\int \frac{\log x}{x} d x=\int t \cdot d t=\frac{t^{2}}{2}+C=\frac{(\log x)^{2}}{2}+C
$$

2. Matrix $A$ is a matrix of order 2 .

$$
\text { Identity matrix of second order is }\left[\begin{array}{ll}
1 & 0 \\
0 & 1
\end{array}\right]
$$

For A to be an identity matrix,
$\left[\begin{array}{ll}1 & 0 \\ 0 & 1\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{cc}\cos \alpha & -\sin \alpha \\ \sin \alpha & \cos \alpha\end{array}\right]$
$\Rightarrow \cos \alpha=1$ and $\sin \alpha=0$
$\Rightarrow \cos \alpha=\cos 0^{\circ}$ and $\sin \alpha=\sin 0^{\circ}$
$\Rightarrow \alpha=0^{\circ}$
Thus, for $\alpha=0^{\circ}, \mathrm{A}$ is an identity matrix
3. Let $\cos ^{-1}\left(-\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right)=x$
$\Rightarrow \cos x=-\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$
$\Rightarrow \cos x=-\cos \left(\frac{\pi}{6}\right)$
$\Rightarrow \cos x=\cos \left(\pi-\frac{\pi}{6}\right)$
$\Rightarrow \cos x=\cos \left(\frac{5 \pi}{6}\right)$
$\Rightarrow x=\frac{5 \pi}{6}$

Therefore, the principal value of $\cos ^{-1}\left(-\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right)$ is $\frac{5 \pi}{6}$
4. The $y$-axis can be represented in vector form by $\hat{j}$ and $-\hat{j}$.

Let $\overrightarrow{\mathrm{a}}=\sqrt{2} \hat{\mathrm{i}}+\hat{\mathrm{j}}+\mathrm{k}$ and $\overrightarrow{\mathrm{b}}=\hat{\mathrm{j}}$ or $-\hat{\mathrm{j}}$
$\cos \theta=\frac{\hat{\mathrm{a}} \cdot \mathrm{b}}{|\hat{\mathrm{a}}||\mathrm{b}|}$
$\therefore \cos \theta=\frac{(\sqrt{2} \hat{i}+\hat{j}+k) \cdot( \pm \hat{j})}{|\sqrt{2} \hat{i}+\hat{j}+k||\hat{j}|}= \pm \frac{1 \times 1}{\sqrt{(\sqrt{2})^{2}+(1)^{2}+(1)^{2}} \times \sqrt{1^{2}}}= \pm \frac{1}{\sqrt{4}}= \pm \frac{1}{2}$
So, the cosine of the angle which the vector $\sqrt{2} \hat{\mathrm{i}}+\hat{\mathrm{j}}+\mathrm{k}$ makes with y axis is $\pm \frac{1}{2}$
5. Unit vector along the direction of vector $\vec{a}, \hat{a}=\frac{\vec{a}}{|\vec{a}|}$

Let $\vec{a}=\hat{i}-2 \hat{j}+2 k$
$|\vec{a}|=\sqrt{(1)^{2}+(-2)^{2}+(2)^{2}}= \pm 3$
i.e. $\hat{a}=\frac{1}{3}(\hat{i}-2 \hat{j}+2 k)$

So, the vector whose magnitude is 15 and has direction along the vector $\hat{i}-2 \hat{j}+2 k$ is given by,
$15 \times\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)(\mathrm{i}-2 \hat{\mathrm{j}}+2 \mathrm{k})$
$=5(\hat{i}-2 \hat{j}+2 \mathrm{k})$
$=(5 \hat{i}-10 \hat{j}+10 \mathrm{k})$
So the required vector is $5 \hat{i}-10 \hat{j}+10 k$
6.
$f(x)$ is not defined at $x=1$.
For $\mathrm{x} \geq 1, \mathrm{f}(\mathrm{x})=\frac{|\mathrm{x}-1|}{(\mathrm{x}-1)}=\frac{(\mathrm{x}-1)}{(\mathrm{x}-1)}=1$
For $\mathrm{x}<1, \mathrm{f}(\mathrm{x})=\frac{|\mathrm{x}-1|}{(\mathrm{x}-1)}=\frac{-(\mathrm{x}-1)}{(\mathrm{x}-1)}=\frac{(1-\mathrm{x})}{(\mathrm{x}-1)}=-1$
Thus, range of the function is either -1 or 1 at all the points and is undefined at $x=1$

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7. 

Given determinant $=\left|\begin{array}{ccc}2 & -3 & 5 \\ 6 & 0 & 4 \\ 1 & 5 & -7\end{array}\right|$
Minor of the element $a_{23}$ is $M_{23}$
Obtained by deleting III column and IIrow

$$
\begin{aligned}
M_{23} & =\left|\begin{array}{cc}
2 & -3 \\
1 & 5
\end{array}\right| \\
& =10-(-3) \\
& =13
\end{aligned}
$$

8. The given equation of line is $\frac{x-5}{3}=\frac{y+4}{7}=\frac{6-z}{2}$

The given equation of line is $\frac{x-5}{3}=\frac{y+4}{7}=\frac{6-z}{2}$
i.e in standard form $\frac{x-5}{3}=\frac{y-(-4)}{7}=\frac{z-6}{-2}$

Comparing this equation with standard form $\frac{x-x_{1}}{a}=\frac{y-y_{1}}{b}=\frac{z-z_{1}}{c}$
We get, $\mathrm{x}_{1}=5, \mathrm{y}_{1}=-4, \mathrm{z}_{1}=6, \mathrm{a}=3, \mathrm{~b}=7, \mathrm{c}=-2$
Thus, the required line is parallel to the vector $3 \hat{i}+7 \hat{j}-2 k$ and passes through the point $(5,-4,6)$.
The vector form of the line can be written as $\vec{r}=\vec{a}+\lambda \vec{b}$, where $\lambda$ is a constant.
Thus, the required equation is $\vec{r}=(5 \hat{i}-4 \hat{j}+6 k)+\lambda(3 \hat{i}+7 \hat{j}-2 k)$
9. Given differential equation is $5 x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-6 y=\log x$

In the above equation the highest order derivate is $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}$ and its power is 1 .
Thus, the degree of differential equation $5 x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-6 y=\log x$ is 1 .

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10. Given $\left[\begin{array}{ll}1 & 2 \\ 3 & 4\end{array}\right]\left[\begin{array}{ll}3 & 1 \\ 2 & 5\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{ll}7 & 11 \\ k & 23\end{array}\right]$

Now using matrix multiplication in LHS, we get

$$
\begin{aligned}
& {\left[\begin{array}{ll}
1 \times 3+2 \times 2 & 1 \times 1+2 \times 5 \\
3 \times 3+4 \times 2 & 3 \times 1+4 \times 5
\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{ll}
7 & 11 \\
\mathrm{k} & 23
\end{array}\right]} \\
& \Rightarrow\left[\begin{array}{cc}
3+4 & 1+10 \\
9+8 & 3+20
\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
7 & 11 \\
\mathrm{k} & 23
\end{array}\right] \\
& \Rightarrow\left[\begin{array}{cc}
7 & 11 \\
17 & 23
\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{cc}
7 & 11 \\
\mathrm{k} & 23
\end{array}\right]
\end{aligned}
$$

Now on equating the corresponding elements we get the value of $\mathrm{k}=17$

## SECTION - B

11. Here, $f(x)= \begin{cases}|x|+3, & x \leq 3 \\ -2 x, & -3<x<3 \\ 6 x+2, & x \geq 3\end{cases}$

The function is defined on all the points and hence continuous possible points of discontinuity are 3 and -3 . We need to check the continuity of the function at two points $\mathrm{x}=3$ and $\mathrm{x}=-3$.
Case 1: For $x=-3, f(-3)=-(-3)+3=6$
LHL $=\lim _{x \rightarrow-3^{-}} f(x)=\lim _{h \rightarrow 0}(-(-3-h)+3)=6$
RHL $=\lim _{x \rightarrow-3^{+}} f(x)=\lim _{h \rightarrow 0}(-2(-3+h))=(-2) \times(-3)=6$
Since, $\lim _{x \rightarrow-3^{-}} f(x)=\lim _{x \rightarrow-3^{+}} f(x)=f(-3)$
So, f iscontinuousat $\mathrm{x}=-3$
Case2: For $x=3, f(c)=6(3)+2=20$
LHL $=\lim _{x \rightarrow 3^{-}} f(x)=\lim _{h \rightarrow 0}(-2(3-h)=-2 \times 3=-6$
RHL $=\lim _{x \rightarrow 3^{+}} f(x)=\lim _{h \rightarrow 0}(6(3+h)+2)=6 \times 3+2=20$
Since, $\lim _{x \rightarrow 3^{-}} f(x) \neq \lim _{x \rightarrow 3^{+}} f(x)$
Therefore, function $f$ is not continuousat point $x=3$
Hence $x=3$ is the only point of discontinuity.

OR
$y=(\cos x)^{x}+(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}$
For simplification, Let us consider $y=A+B$ such that $A=(\cos x)^{x}$ and $B=(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}$
Then, $\frac{d y}{d x}=\frac{d A}{d x}+\frac{d B}{d x}$
$A=(\cos x)^{x}$
Taking logarithms on both the sides, we have,

$$
\begin{align*}
& \log A=x \log (\cos x) \\
& \begin{aligned}
\frac{1}{\mathrm{~A}} \frac{\mathrm{dA}}{\mathrm{dx}} & =\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{dx}}[\mathrm{x} \log (\cos \mathrm{x})] \\
\Rightarrow \frac{\mathrm{dA}}{\mathrm{dx}} & =\mathrm{A} \frac{\mathrm{~d}}{\mathrm{dx}}[\mathrm{x} \log (\cos \mathrm{x})] \\
& =(\cos \mathrm{x})^{x}\left[x \frac{d}{d x}(\log (\cos x))+\log (\cos x) \frac{d}{d x}(x)\right] \\
& =(\cos x)^{x}\left[x \frac{1}{\cos x}(-\sin x)+\log (\cos x)(1)\right] \\
& =(\cos x)^{x}[-x \tan x+\log (\cos x)]
\end{aligned} . .(2)
\end{align*}
$$

Now, $B=(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}$

$$
B=(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}
$$

Taking logarithms on both the sides, we have,

$$
\begin{align*}
\log B & =\frac{1}{x} \log (\sin x) \\
\frac{1}{B} \frac{d B}{d x} & =\frac{d}{d x}\left[\frac{1}{x} \log (\sin x)\right] \\
\Rightarrow \frac{d B}{d x} & =B \frac{d}{d x}\left[\frac{1}{x} \log (\sin x)\right] \\
& =(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}\left[\frac{1}{x} \frac{d}{d x}(\log (\sin x))+\log (\sin x) \frac{d}{d x}\left(\frac{1}{x}\right)\right] \\
& =(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}\left[\frac{1}{x} \frac{1}{\sin x}(\cos x)+\log (\sin x)\left(-\frac{1}{x^{2}}\right)\right] \\
& =(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}\left[\frac{1}{x} \cot x-\left(\frac{1}{x^{2}}\right) \log (\sin x)\right] \\
& =(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}\left[\frac{x \cot x-\log (\sin x)}{x^{2}}\right] \tag{3}
\end{align*}
$$

Now, on substituting (2) and (3) in (1) we get

$$
\frac{d y}{d x}=(\cos x)^{x}[-x \tan x+\log (\cos x)]+(\sin x)^{\frac{1}{x}}\left[\frac{x \cot x-\log (\sin x)}{x^{2}}\right]
$$

12. Let $t=\tan ^{-1} \sqrt{\mathrm{x}}$

So $\sqrt{x}=\tan t$
i.e. $\tan ^{2} t=x$

On substituting $x$ in the R.H.S. of equation $\tan ^{-1} \sqrt{x}=\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{1-x}{1+x}\right)$,
we get $\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{1-\mathrm{x}}{1+\mathrm{x}}\right)=\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{1-\tan ^{2} \mathrm{t}}{1+\tan ^{2} \mathrm{t}}\right)$
Now, using the formula $\cos 2 \theta=\left(\frac{1-\tan ^{2} \theta}{1+\tan ^{2} \theta}\right)$ we have

$$
\begin{array}{r}
\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{1-x}{1+x}\right)=\frac{1}{2} \cos ^{-1}(\cos (2 t)) \\
=t=\tan ^{-1} \sqrt{x}=\text { LHS }
\end{array}
$$

Hence Proved.
OR

Let a be in I quadrant such that

$$
\cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)=\mathrm{a}
$$

So $\cos \mathrm{a}=\frac{12}{13}$
$\Rightarrow \sin a=\sqrt{1-\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)^{2}}$

$$
=\sqrt{1-\frac{144}{169}}
$$

$$
=\sqrt{\frac{169-144}{169}}
$$

$$
=\sqrt{\frac{25}{169}}=\frac{5}{13}
$$

And $\tan \mathrm{a}=\frac{5}{12}$
So, $\mathrm{a}=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{5}{12}\right)$
Again $b \in I$ quadrant such that $\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)=b$

So, $\sin \mathrm{b}=\frac{3}{5}$

$$
\begin{aligned}
\Rightarrow \cos & =\sqrt{1-\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)^{2}} \\
& =\sqrt{1-\frac{9}{25}} \\
& =\sqrt{\frac{16}{25}}=\frac{4}{5}
\end{aligned}
$$

And $\tan \mathrm{b}=\frac{3}{4}$
So, $b=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)$
Now, let $\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{65}\right)=\mathrm{c}$ where c is in I quadrant
So, $\sin \mathrm{c}=\frac{56}{65}$
$\Rightarrow \operatorname{cosc}=\sqrt{1-\left(\frac{56}{65}\right)^{2}}$

$$
=\sqrt{1-\frac{3136}{4225}}
$$

$$
=\sqrt{\frac{4225-3136}{4225}}
$$

$$
=\sqrt{\frac{1089}{4225}}=\frac{33}{65}
$$

And, $\tan \mathrm{c}=\frac{56}{33}$
So $\mathrm{c}=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{33}\right)$
$\Rightarrow \sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{65}\right)=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{33}\right) \ldots$.
Now, we need to prove $\cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)+\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)=\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{65}\right)$
Consider $\mathrm{a}+\mathrm{b}$
$=\cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)+\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)$
$=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{5}{12}\right)+\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)\left[\begin{array}{l}\cos ^{-1}\left(\frac{12}{13}\right)=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{5}{12}\right) \text { and } \\ \sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)\end{array}\right]$
$=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{\frac{5}{12}+\frac{3}{4}}{1-\left(\frac{5}{12} \times \frac{3}{4}\right)}\right)\left[\right.$ Using, $\left.\tan ^{-1} x+\tan ^{-1} y=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{x+y}{1-x y}\right)\right]$
$=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{20+36}{48-15}\right)$
$=\tan ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{33}\right)$
$=\mathrm{c}=\sin ^{-1}\left(\frac{56}{65}\right) \quad$ [Using,eq(3)]
Hence Proved.
13. Let $X$ denote the number of questions answered correctly by guessing in multiple choice examinations.
Probability of getting a correct answer by guessing, $\mathrm{p}=\frac{1}{3}$
Therefore, $q$, the probability of an incorrect answer by guessing is $=1-\frac{1}{3}=\frac{2}{3}$
There are in 5 questions in all.
So X follows binomial distribution with $\mathrm{n}=5, \mathrm{p}=\frac{1}{3}$ and $\mathrm{q}=\frac{2}{3}$

The second equation of line is $\frac{x-3}{4}=\frac{y-3}{6}=\frac{z+5}{12}$
The above equation can also be written as $\frac{x-3}{4}=\frac{y-3}{6}=\frac{z-(-5)}{12}$
The vector form of this equation is
